### Honor Recipients Lead List Of 210 History Graduates

BUCHANAN AWARD WINNER Lee Shaker and three students who completed the Senior Honors Seminar lead the list of 210 undergraduates graduating with degrees in History this year.

Another 22 students will be taking MA and PhD degrees (see story, p. 3).

The undergraduate list includes 27 students who graduated in Fall 2001, another 27 who graduated in Winter 2002 and 29 who have registered to graduate after the Summer term. It also includes two student who graduated with a degree in History of Public Policy.

The largest group, 127 students, graduates this Spring.

Commencement ceremonies for History majors are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m; on Sunday, June 16 on the Faculty Club Green.

The ceremony will be preceded by the History Department's annual reception for graduating seniors and their families, which will be held from 10:30-12:30 in the History Conference Room, 4020 HSSB.

Shaker, who was tapped as the outstanding graduating senior in History (see story, p. 2) was also one of two majors selected for admission into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious liberal arts honor society. Mattias Flores

#### Top TA, Teacher Awards Go to Cowan, Garcia

HISTORY CONTINUED ITS dominance of the Academic Senate teaching awards this year, with Maeve Cowan receiving the Distinguished Teaching Assistant award and Prof. Mario Garcia named as the Distinguished Teacher.

History TAs have now won that award for the second year in a row and the fourth time in the past five years.

Among the faculty, Prof. Randy Bergstrom won the Distinguished Teacher award in 1999 and Fred Logevall in 1998.

The award capped a banner month for Cowan, who earlier learned she had won the department's J. Bruce Anderson award as outstanding TA in History, and then received a Graduate Opportunity Fellowship from the Graduate Division to work on her dissertation, "From Watergate to the Ethics in Government Act: Contested Visions of Presidential Autonomy, 1973-1978," which she is writing for Prof. Laura Kalman.

History Prof. Al Lindemann, himself a former Distinguished Teacher award winner and chair of the Senate Committee on Effective Teaching and Instructional Support (CETIS) this year, said the committee "showed unusual unanimity" in selecting Cowan.

### Garcia, Cowan Earn Top Teacher Nods

**CONTINUED FROM P. 1** "The professors with whom Maeve has worked were especially eloquent in praise of her," he said. "One wrote that 'Only ten minutes in classroom with Maeve is enough to sense she is something special.'

All professors remarked on her ability to challenge her students, while projecting a genuine concern for them."

Student comments were, if possible, even more effusive, Prof. Lindemann said.

"Maeve's scores on student evaluations were little short of astonishing. For many of her sections they were 90 per cent in the top or 'Excellent' category, and almost always over 90 per cent in the two top categories of 'Excellent' and 'Very Good.""

Prof. Garcia's award took note of his 26-year record of dedication to teaching, during which time "he has served as both a mentor and role model to his students.

The citation quoted one student who wrote that Prof. Garcia "has inspired me to make a positive difference to the world."

"He strives to integrate his research and his teaching," the citation noted, adding that "his colleagues in the Chicano Stud-

ies and History departments especially value his commitment to intellectual rigor and scholarly balance."

A former Guggenheim Fellow, Prof. Garcia is the author and co-author of ten books, including *The Making of a Mexican-American Mayor* (1998), a biography of El Paso's Raymond L. Telles, and most recently *Migrant Daughter: Coming of Age as a Mexican American Woman*, which he wrote with Frances Tywoniak.

## Jenn See Wins Outstanding Grad Prize At Department's Annual Awards Show

JENNIFER SEE WON the Richard K. Mayberry Award as the outstanding graduate student in History at the department's annual Awards Ceremony on May 15.

A student of Prof. Fred Logevall, Jenn was cited in particular for the work she has done on a comparative study of the origins of what became known as the policy of containment early in the Cold War era.

At the ceremony, the UCSB History Associates distributed more than \$30,000 in awards and prizes, including funds collected in this year's scholarship campaign.

"This is what makes all of our efforts worthwhile," said Associates Pres. Monica Orozco, who co-presided over the ceremony with History Chair Jack Talbott.

Awards included prizes for best undergraduate and graduate papers written during the 2000-01 academic year.

The Stuart L. Bernath Prize for best undergraduate seminar paper went to **Courtney Salera** for her paper, "Kristallnacht: What Makes Us Remember?"

Two students received the William H. Ellison Prize for best graduate seminar paper.

Erin Edmonds (Kalman) was recognized for her paper on "Critical Race Theory: Where Do We Go From Here?" and Corinne Wieben (Lansing) for her paper on "The Political Life of Verdiana de Castelfiorentino."

The History Associates Board Prize, crated to recognize the best paper in the department's year-long Senior Honors Seminar, went to **Bianca Murillo** for her paper, "Urban Experiences of Elite Women in Colonial Ghana 1880-1939."

Jamie Morrow received the Nicholas and Lena Dumas Award for the best undergraduate paper on a topic in Greek History and Culture.

In other undergraduate awards, **Melissa Kravetz** won the Marion Ramstad scholarship for study of European or Asian history. She will intern at the Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D. C. this summer.

The Daughters of the American Revolution scholarship, awarded to a History major eligible for next year's Senior Honors Seminar for writing on a topic in American history, went to **Jenna Berger**, who has undertaken an internship with the Santa Barbara Trust for Historic Preservation.

In graduate prizes, Nancy McLoughlin (Farmer) was first recipient of the new C. Warren Hollister Memorial Fellowship for outstanding work in medieval European history.

She was cited for her research on the role of Jean Gerson, chancellor of the University of Paris, in theological and political controversies of the 15th century.

The Dick Cook Memorial Award for outstanding service went to **Michael Proulx** (Drake) "for his efforts at creating and maintaining a community of scholars" in the department.

Maeve Cowan (Kalman) won the J. Bruce Anderson Award as outstanding TA in History.

Two students of Ann Plane's—Monte Kim and Ann Peterson—shared this year's Robert L. Kelly Fellowship for outstanding work in the fields of U. S. Intellectual history, public history or the history of public policy.



Thomas Sizgorich (Drake) won the Esmé Frost Fellowship in pre-modern European history for his study of the role of monks in defining early Christian and Islamic civilizations in Late Antiquity.

David Burden (Cline) won the Philip W. Powell Prize in the field of Latin American and Iberian studies for his research on Mexican policies on internal migration and foreign immigration in the 19th century.

Seven students were awarded History Associates Fellowships.

Leading the list was **Janet McFall** (McGee), who won the prestigious Jo Beth Van Gelderen Award, created by the Associates to honor one of their most stalwart supporters.

Other fellowships went to **Rhimou Bernkiho-Canin** (Gallagher), **Hugo Hernandez** (Rock), **Jon Lemmond** (Friesen), **Maria Lograno** (Humphreys), **Yuriy Malikov** (Hasegawa) and **Jon Nimo** (Rock).

History Associates travel awards, to assist graduate students presenting papers at professional conferences, went to **Sarah Case** (DeHart/Harris), **Jessical Chapman** (Logevall), Alex Fabros (Vargas), **Susan Snyder** (Lansing) and **Danielle Swiontek** (DeHart).

#### 7th Cold War Conference Draws International Field

The two-day event also featured a faculty roundtable on the question of "Cold War Triumphalism," featuring Profs. Mark Lawrence of the University of Texas, Austin; Walter Hixson of the University of Akron, and David Schmitz of Whitman College.

away as Central European University in Budapest and the London School of Economics.
